

They say that God cannot be responsible for evil; humans must have free will to be independant from God's authority.

One example of this would be Adam and Eve when they decided to eat the forbidden fruit in the garden of Eden. Fate is not a Christian idea and Christians do not believe that life is planned out for them. However, some Christians believe that God has already decided who will go to heaven and who will go to hell.


